fucktooth #15 and number twenty two Jen Angel, Ohio, 1994 and 1996

I started with #15. This is a pretty dense zine to start out with, and it's author Jen Angel, seems pretty ambivalent about including so-called personal stuff in it, but finds it spills over anyway into their rants, show reviews and other writing. I was pleased to find a menstrual pad pattern included in a zine outside of contemporary menstruation zines! Their rants make me feel like they're in a bad mood. In Rant 10, thoughts on Reviews and Zines in general, they discuss how just sending a dollar and an address and an envelope reduces a zine to a commodity, how - in the words of Joe Gervasi of NO LONGER A FANzine: 'the explosion of zines leaves us with "a lot of sloppy half baked wastes of precious trees put out by non-writers looking for a cheap way to A) get laid B) fit in with a crowd that supposedly stressed originality and individuality, or C) spit misspelled venom all over an indifferent and pseudojaded readership" and yet how there continues to be zines that inspire, reaffirm. They cover their relationship with reviewing zines, and their policy on trades. I'm curious what their opinion of their zine being in Glasgow Women's Library would be. Alongside writing from Jen is articles like the one from Craig on a history of autonomous culture in Detroit.

Number twenty two is also a behemoth. It starts with a rant on sex and sexuality where it clarifies that Fucktooth started as a queer zine – I initially read it as a music fanzine tbh. And that tallies with the topics and writing in this issue, which unlike #15 is much less geared towards the typical band reviews and discussions. I love the little review supplement. There's a substantial focus on health stuff in this issue.

It's explicitly political. I enjoyed the Jubilee Exclusive issue (which starts: '2012 – what the fuck is going on?') I hope they are still active and will furnish us with a Queen's death issue.

In Scots, Hana tells their story 'or at least, the parts that I feel comfortable wae sharing' of relationships and particularly non-physical forms of violence in relationships. A gentle blend of type, handwriting and illustrations, it's a sometimes painful, intimate read. It ends with a list of 'Glorious Solo Dates' she has taken herself out on, and a rejection of the notion that you have to love yourself to find love in a healthy relationship. 'You deserve to tae be happy' she writes 'tae strive towards the light.'

Partly it's the lyrics from Sharon's band The Hattifatteners, which I won't reproduce here but needless to say Moomincore Forever! It just a neat blend of song lyrics, short writing and collaged images.
